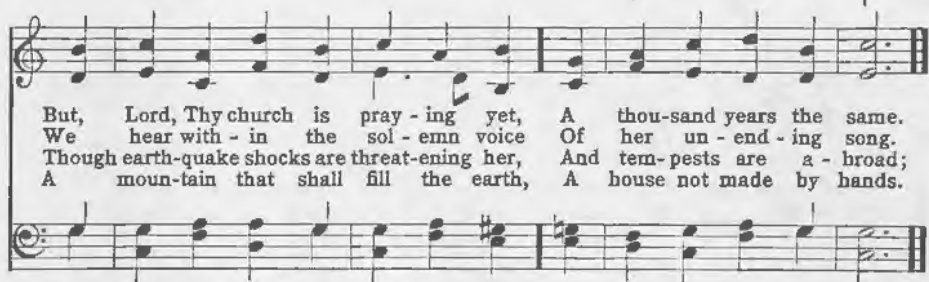

 A moun-tain that shall fill the earth, A house not made by hands.

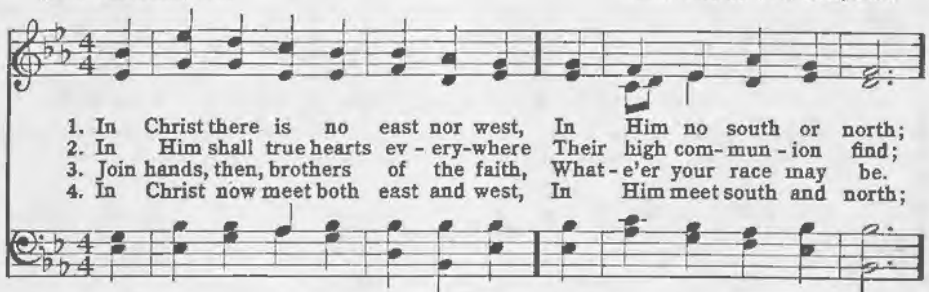

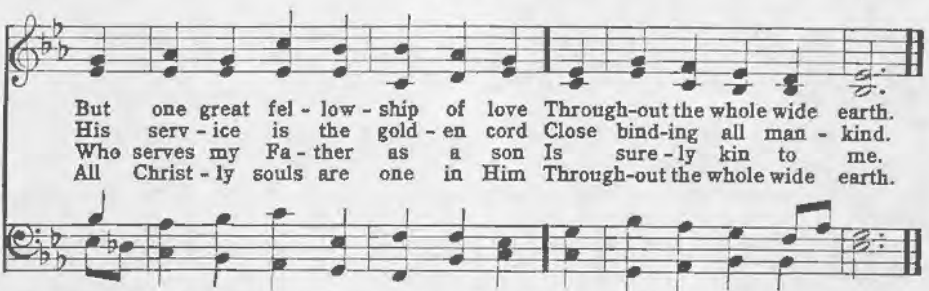
